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## Senator Schoenberg Preempts Lakota Work by Announcing Four Lanes for Willow Road

In a surprise news conference held April 15 at the North Shore Senior Center, Senator Jeff Schoenberg announced his plan to make Willow Road four lanes through Northfield. He indicated that IDOT will begin engineering work with \$4 million of state funds. While the Willow Road Steering Committee, working with the Lakota Group and residents of Northfield and Winnetka for the past year, has completed much of the work on the study, the final plan was yet to be resolved. Two meetings, scheduled for May 1 and May 5, remained for the group to arrive at a consensus on the plan. The plan will be brought to both Village Boards on May 20 for their review and vote. The Lakota Plan takes into consideration IDOT's Context Sensitive Solutions and incorporates the ideas of representatives of both communities for making Willow Road safer while efficiently moving traffic through the villages. *To read President Birkinbine's response to Senator Schoenberg's announcement, go to [www.northfieldil.org](http://www.northfieldil.org).*

## Village Board Approves Amending the Comprehensive Plan and Zoning Code to Provide Flexibility for Redevelopment Plan

Following the recommendation of the Plan and Zoning Commission, the Village Board voted to amend the Comprehensive Plan adopted in 1999 and the current Zoning Code in order to permit greater flexibility for potential developers and to provide for ideas outlined in the new vision plan for redevelopment of the Village Center. Redevelopment of the downtown area has been discussed for nearly two years by members of the Village Center Task Force working with the design team of Myesfki Cook Architects. The Task Force's planning efforts were focused on the commercial area bound by the Edens Expressway to the east, the Middlefork Branch of the river along the west edge, from Mt. Pleasant Street on the south, and up to and including the office and commercial areas north along Central Avenue. The new vision plan for future redevelopment of the downtown area provides a catalyst for growth in the Village Center and acts as an enticement for potential developers by providing for mixes of retail, office and residential uses. Features of the plan include buildings brought closer to the street encouraging greater synergy between retailers and a more pedestrian friendly environment. Varied building heights of two to three and a half stories with different building facades would provide the unique character for the Village downtown area. Other concepts of the plan requiring changes to the zoning code permit buildings up to six stories along the Edens in the office/commercial area with the ability to increase up to eight stories. Another area where changes in zoning will provide for greater flexibility in the types of development is adjacent to the Middlefork River. With the new zoning changes, mixed uses of retail, restaurants, office and upper level condominiums could be built to take advantage of Northfield's unique river area. Other changes recommended include better alignment of Orchard Street on both sides of Happ Road including either straightening of the road and a plaza area or a roundabout in the intersection; benches, as well as planter boxes and other features that provide places for residents to congregate and meet and, distinctive gateway features at the river and the Edens upon entering the downtown area. Changes were also made in the zoning code that would encourage on-street parking in the Village Center and parking in the rear of buildings or in parking structures.

--For residents living at even numbered addresses, sprinkling is allowed on even numbered days.

All residents may sprinkle after 9:00 p.m. and before 9:00 a.m. an all days.

To prevent cutting utility wires, call J.U.L.I.E (1-800-892-0123) at least 48 hours (not including weekends and holidays) before you or your contractor start to dig . J.U.L.I.E. is a free Illinois one-call system for locating underground utilities.

## Village News of Interest and Reminders

### Village Vehicle Stickers on Sale Starting May 12

Applications for FY2008-09 vehicle stickers will be mailed May 9 to all Village residents who purchased stickers last year. Vehicle stickers go on sale beginning May 12 at the Village Hall, 361 Happ Road, from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Mon.- Fri.

**Stickers must be displayed by July 1, 2008.** Vehicles required to be registered and the appropriate fees for stickers/tags are as follows: Passenger Cars - \$50; Motorcycles - \$35; Recreational Vehicles - \$60; Antique Cars - \$20; Trailers - \$20-\$75; Trucks by class - \$60-\$120; Replacement sticker - \$10. A penalty of 50% of the license fee will be added to the cost of any vehicle sticker purchased after **July 15**. For Senior residents (65 years and older) who participate in the State's Circuit Breaker Program requiring an income of less than \$29,480 for couples and \$22,218 for single seniors, one vehicle sticker per household is available at a 50% discount. Northfield stickers are displayed in the lower left hand corner of the front window (driver's side) of each vehicle including passenger vehicles, rv's and trucks. Tags are used for motorcycles & trailers.

### Permits Needed to Add Fences, Sheds, Pools and Playground Equipment

If you are planning to make changes to your home or yard, contact the Village Building Dept. first to find out if a permit is required. Call 847-446-9200 x3551 from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

### Block Parties

To hold a block party, write the Village Manager at least one week prior to the event including the street, date, time, area to be closed and rain date. Public Works Dept. will be notified to deliver barricades a day prior to the event.

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### One-Time Dog, Cat and Horse Registration Makes Process Easy and Protects Pets

The Village's pet registration program requires owners of dogs and cats that are over six months of age to register them with the Village one time during the life of the pet. Residents can download the form via Internet [www.northfieldil.org](http://www.northfieldil.org) under Finance, call 847-446-9200, or fax 847-446-4670 to obtain a form from the Village Hall. The completed form along with proof of rabies inoculation for each dog and/or cat and a fee of \$20 per dog/cat can be mailed or brought to the Village Hall, 361 Happ, between 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. A metal I.D. tag with the pet's name, registration number, owner's address and telephone number will be mailed within 2 to 3 weeks. Horses are also required to be registered. The one-time fee is \$20. Registration of dogs and cats aids in their return if lost or stolen. Ask your veterinarian about having your pets "microchipped." Also, to protect your pets, keep cats indoors and all dogs on a leash. **County and State laws require proof of current rabies shots and a tag for all dogs and cats.**

### Replace Worn or Torn Flags and Dispose of Old Flags in the Proper Way

The New Trier Veterans of Foreign Wars has set up local receptacles for the proper disposal of worn or torn American flags. Drop your worn flags into the receptacle at the Northfield Fire-Rescue Station, 1800 Winnetka Avenue, between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Monday-Friday. Collected flags will be properly burned with honor at a VFW ceremony.

### Keep Rivers and Ditches Free of Debris to Prevent Flooding in Your Area

To prevent blockages and flooding in river areas, do not throw debris and/or landscape waste into the river. After storms, residents along the river should check for fallen trees in the river and report them to the Public Works Dept.,

### Public Works Dept. Begins Hydrant Flushing in May

The Village Public Works staff will be opening and flushing hydrants to remove accumulated sediment and improve water flow beginning in mid-May as part of its annual fire hydrant and watermain maintenance program. Hydrant flushing will be done in the early morning and can cause discoloration of water. Residents should run their **cold** water until it is clear. Residents who have questions or need additional information can contact the Public Works Dept., 847-441-3810 between 7 a.m. and 4 p.m.

### 10 Ways You Can Improve the Quality of Stormwater Runoff

1. Cover piles of soil, sand or mulch to stop them from being transported in stormwater. Plant grass where soil is exposed.
2. Sweep your sidewalks and driveways rather than hosing them down.
3. Put leaves and grass clippings in the compost, on the garden as mulch, or mow back into the lawn to recycle nutrients.
4. Divert roof water to lawns or gardens where it can safely soak in.
5. Keep pesticides, oil, leaves and other pollutants off streets, out of storm drains.
6. Keep cars tuned up and repair leaks.
7. Wash vehicles on grass or over gravel. Use as little detergent as you can and pour leftover soapy water onto the lawn.
8. Dispose of household hazardous waste according to label directions.
10. Never dump anything down storm drains! Water from these drains flows untreated to the river.

### Village Board Approves Funding for Stormwater Study

A two phase stormwater study has been approved to help assess various stormwater drainage and flooding issues in the Village and to develop strategies to address them. This is part of the Village-wide Stormwater Management Plan being developed that will prioritize improvements and develop policies and procedures to reduce future flooding impacts and damages. The survey will provide information on individual and neighborhood drainage issues.

## More Village News

### **Board Adopts FY2008-2009 Village Budget**

The \$11.3 million operating budget for FY2008-09 approved by the Village Board at their April 15 meeting reflects an increase of 5.2% over FY2007-08. The operating budget again meets the Board's goal of a balanced budget. The operating budget includes revenues and expenditures in the Village's General, Water and Sanitary Sewer Funds and reflects a 4.4% increase in salary expenditures, a 3.5% increase in all other operating expenses and an 11% increase in benefit costs. At the same time, the General Fund balance of \$4.7 million maintains six months of operating expenditures, meeting another Board objective.

### **FY2008-09 Capital Budget**

The Capital Budget for FY2008-09 includes \$3.7 million for projects related to water, sanitary sewers, road and sidewalk improvements, equipment replacement and includes a comprehensive storm water drainage study. The 2008-09 Budget also includes \$1.2 million for completion of the new water transmission line from Winnetka. Earlier in the year, the Village completed an emergency water interconnect with Glencoe and installed a water monitoring system - all part of the upgrades in the Village's water system being paid for by bonds issued in September 2007. The Capital Budget continues to reflect the Village's efforts to replace aging infrastructure for the safety and well being of residents.

### **Water Rate**

In January 2008, the Village instituted a 67 cent per 100 cubic feet of water billed debt service charge to pay for the bonds issued in 2007. No new water rate increase is included in the FY2008-09 Village Budget.

### **Tickets Now being Issued for Red Light Camera Violations in Northfield**

Vehicles that cross the white stop line at an intersection after the light has turned red trigger a camera and issuance of a violation at the intersections of Wagner and Willow and Waukegan Road and Willow. Only sworn officers review the red light videos and determine if a violation should be issued. When a violation is issued, the owner of the vehicle is sent a violation notice and a fine of \$75. The notice gives instructions on how to view the video of the vehicle and violation on the internet. Any citation not paid by the due date will have an additional \$100 late fee assessed for a total fine of \$175. The red light cameras are being used to help increase safety and prevent crashes by those who run red lights.

### **Traps Used to Detect Emerald Ash Borer as it Continues to Spread-- Quarantined Areas Prohibit Movement of Ash Wood**

Since 2006, when ash trees infected with Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) were identified in the Villages of Wilmette, Winnetka, Evanston, and an unincorporated area of St. Charles, this devastating infestation has spread to parts of Cook, DuPage, Kane and LaSalle Countys. Currently, the EAB Quarantine area includes the entire counties of Boone, Cook, DeKalb, Grundy, Kane, Kankakee, Kendall, Lake, LaSalle, McHenry, Putnam, Will and Winnebago. In an effort to prevent the spread of the beetle, the Illinois Dept. of Agriculture in cooperation with the USDA Animal and Plant Inspection service will use box-kite looking purple traps hung in ash trees in Illinois to look for EAB. Approximately 2,700 traps will be hung in a 100-mile wide band that includes 49 counties across central and northwestern Illinois with an additional 750 traps placed in the Chicagoland area to determine the areas where beetles are currently. Homeowners, landscapers and others in the quarantined areas are prohibited from moving potentially-infested wood products including all types of firewood, ash lumber, logs, wood chips and branches unless the material has been treated by fumigation, kiln-dried or chipped into small pieces.

### **Signs and Symptoms of Emerald Ash Borer (EAB)**

The Emerald Ash Borer is a 1/2 inch long metallic green beetle. The adult female emerges in May-July to lay eggs in bark crevices and between layers of bark on ash trees. When the eggs hatch, the larvae bore into the tree where they chew the inner bark and phloem cutting off water and nutrients to the tree causing dieback and death. Signs and symptoms of EAB on an ash tree include:

- crown dieback - branches at the top of the tree die first and more die in subsequent years
- suckers sprouting from the base of the tree
- bark splitting vertically
- 1/8 inch diameter "D" shaped exit hole used by adult beetles that may appear anywhere on the trunk or upper branches
- woodpeckers feeding on larvae on the tree.

### Village-Wide Clean Up Day Scheduled for Saturday, May 17 - Stack Items at the Curb by 7 AM

Time to clean out your home, garage, attic and basement - it's **Northfield's Spring Clean-Up Day, Saturday, May 17**. All large household items are to be placed at the curb by 7:00 a.m. Organize and bundle all loose materials into cartons, bags, boxes, etc. for easy lifting. Items that will be picked up include: furniture, tv's, mattresses, carpeting, clothing, floor tiles, bicycles, lawn mowers (gas and oil removed), computers and/or printers (not commercial size) and dried water-based (latex) paint. *For disposal of white goods including refrigerators/freezers, stoves, washers and dryers, or building/remodeling debris (replaced toilets, sinks, tubs, windows, drywall, lumber, etc.), call Waste Management to arrange for a special pick-up, 1-800-796-9696.* No regular garbage or landscape waste will be picked up on this special clean-up day. Please dispose of Hazardous Wastes at the appropriate locations. Hazardous Wastes are collected regularly at the following sites: HHW Drop Center (Goose Island), 1150 N. North Branch in Chicago, Tues. 7 am-Noon, Thurs. 2-7 pm and the first Sat. of each month from 8 am-3 pm.; in Naperville, 1971 Brookdale Road, Fire Station #4, 630-420-6700x7559 and, the Rock River Reclamation District, 3333 Kishwaukee, 815-967-6737. Hazardous Wastes collected at these locations include aerosol paints and pesticides, anti-freeze, cleaning products, herbicides, household batteries, insecticides, lawn chemicals, old gasoline, paint thinners, solvents, used motor oil, and oil-based paint (no latex paint). ### Inside Tips on Burglary Schemes

The Police Dept. warns that Chicagoland area seniors are being approached by burglars usually working in teams. Burglars use stories that work is being done in the area and they need the homeowner to check on their water heater or come outside to show them where the gas meter is located. Their main objective is to get the homeowner to one part of the home or outside so the burglar's teammate can steal cash, jewelry, etc. The Police Dept. advises that if someone is making an unsolicited request to enter your home, tell them you wish to have the Police check their credentials. It is a small and welcome request the Northfield Police will perform. Call the Police 24 hours a day/7 days a week, 847-446-2131.

### Safe Routes to School Group Seeks Your Input to Improve Walking/Biking Conditions

The Safe Routes to School Committee is made up of a group of community leaders from local religious institutions, School District 29, the Village of Northfield, concerned citizens and parents. This group is working to establish a Safe Routes to Schools Program which is federally funded. The program is administered by the Illinois Dept. of Transportation (IDOT) and provides grants to communities that have identified safe routes to school and necessary improvements needed to increase safety. The Committee will be determining the safest routes for children to take when walking or biking to Northfield schools; will suggest safety improvements needed for the routes; develop fun ways to encourage more children to use those routes and look at ways to slow the traffic around the schools. The three main goals of the Safe Routes to School Program are:

1. Enable and encourage children, including those with disabilities, to walk and bicycle to school.
  2. Make bicycling and walking to school a safer and more appealing transportation alternative, thereby encouraging a healthy and active lifestyle from an early age, and
  3. Facilitate the planning, development and implementation of projects and activities that will improve safety and reduce traffic, fuel consumption and air pollution in the vicinity of both public and private primary and middle schools (K-8).
- Some typical projects covered by the program include building new sidewalks and bike paths, improving existing sidewalks and bike paths, installing traffic signals and signs as well as non-infrastructure projects that include education, encouragement, enforcement and evaluation.
